The Ardlethan Showground was once a focal point of the town for its regional shows, agricultural expositions, horse races, dog trials, gala days and golf tournaments, attracting large crowds looking to sample country life and injecting much needed funds into the small rural community. The Show Society is confident that reinstating the Bar Area back to its former prime will help stimulate the local economy not only in its capacity to host such local events but as an attractive venue for broader regional tourism.

\$25,000 for a Sports Shear and Shearing Education facility. In conjunction with the Barraba Show, the Barraba P, A&H Association is setting up a facility to run a sports shear and wool handling competition as part of its annual Show. The facility will also have a future being used for shearing education camps for community and school-based groups. This program, along with annual competitions, will educate, train and contribute not only to the community of Barraba in a fundraising capacity, but also to the shearing, wool handling professions and Agricultural industry.

The Sports Shear and Shearing Education facility aims to broaden community interest in the industry as well as increase the number of patrons attending the Show and supporting the Barraba region. This will in turn expand local involvement and increase job opportunities. The significant economic benefit for local farmers, due to the close proximity of local shearers, means the elimination of travel costs of crews that are otherwise interstate. Moreover, the community economic benefit for local families and their children to attend a quality facility without the huge economic outlay to attend facilities further afield, is important. The facility will be used in a way to promote and represent the shearing and wool handling professions as a major contributor to the Agricultural Industry and Australian Economy.

This seating comes in a grandstand design holding up to 40 people and is suitable anywhere in the Showground. It can be easily moved by a tractor so it is suitable for the covered arena, the cattle pavilion, the yard dogs, sporting games, harness races and horse events.

A large, covered arena exists at the Blayney Showground, but only with minimal seating, and none of it is grandstand style. The portable grandstand seating can be moved by tractor to any place in the Showground depending on the event. Audiences at cattle, horse, and sheep & heifer events will benefit greatly. In fact, grandstand style seating will encourage greater attendance at competitions and displays, which has a direct benefit to the whole community including local business in catering and accommodation. When local business benefit in this way, sponsorship to maintain higher community participation results. Not to be overlooked is the ability for families and community members to enjoy sitting together at events—which is key to maintain a thriving community!

Project: \$17,000 for portable panels for horse and dog yards to assist in the expansion of local events. This will enable increased entries and increased community collaboration. Better facilities are also likely to increase sponsorship and prize money support at the annual Show, which all goes back to the local community.

Despite the recent impacts of the 2019/20 black-summer bushfires and COVID, the Bombala rural community has been working hard to grow and develop its annual Show Day. The horse events and yard dog trials have been identified as attracting the much-desired younger demographic of show competitors and volunteers. For these events to grow, Bombala urgently requires better quality portable horse and yard dog infrastructure. Bombala Exhibition Society has the full support of its volunteers and management committee, the NSW Yards Dogs Association, the Bombala Team Sorting Committee, as well as enthusiastic support from horse event groups in the region keen for the Bombala Show to grow. With the addition of these much-needed portable panels, the Bombala Show will not only be able to deliver safe and well-organised events, but the strong community collaboration already developed by the annual Show Day, and its focus on rural industry and regional connections, will only increase with the delivery of this project.

\$25,000 Portable seating to be used at Dubbo Showtime, for Dubbo Ranch Sorting Competitions, Zone Young Judges Group Finals, Education Days, and for other community event users such as the cattle and sheep shows, and local football clubs.

The Dubbo Show Society Showground offers space to cater for local and national events, however there is a significant lack of seating at the Dubbo Show Society Showground. Increasing the number of available seats will encourage more rentals of the venue, as well as increased patronage of the local Shows and events. This will significantly increase the economic benefit to the various events, which directly benefits the town and the local community. Additional seats also enables better management of crowds attending events. Aiding the viability of the local economy, the Dubbo Show Society is purposefully employing a local welding company to make the portable chairs, which business is locally owned and operated, and which supports the Show in times of need with sponsorship. The community and the Showground enjoy a beneficial symbiotic relationship. The Dubbo Show Society is celebrating its 150th Show this May, and to do so with more seats for the anticipated crowds, is vastly appreciated.

Temporary fencing will greatly benefit the management of disaster relief at the showground and will ensure compliance with safety requirements. Moreover, without the need and extra cost to hire temporary fencing, this addition will result in both the reduced cost to hold a community event, as well as increased opportunity to host events at the Macksville showground. The entire Nambucca Valley community will benefit, including agriculture, indigenous, local school and existing showground user groups. Ultimately, the safety of all community-based activities at the showground will be greatly enhanced.

\$21,000 to fix fire-damaged facilities. Last year, the storage shed was destroyed by fire—including all its contents: tables, chairs, marquees, barbecues, signage, maintenance and safety equipment, etc. Additionally, the water tank and stand were lost to the fire. Repairing the aging grandstand will also create a safe and welcoming space for audiences to view Team Penning and Natural Horsemanship events, markets and festivals. Without these assets, it is difficult to run community events and to hire out the reserve to local community groups.

The Unkya Reserve Committee of Management assists the rural community in ongoing bushfire, flood and COVID recovery, and supports community events such as local growers, hobby farmers, rural small businesses, bi-monthly markets, and fundraising through BBQs and food sales. It hosts local groups who conduct fundraising on site which benefits the locally economy. The entire community-at-large will benefit from having a safer and fit-for-purpose facility, resulting in greater appreciation for and use of the grounds and facilities.
