Once qualified, he looks forward to contributing to innovative machinery and equipment design changes that will make a difference to the working lives of our farmers.

RAS Foundation Community Futures Grants encourage and champion rural youth leadership by providing up to \$25,000 funding for community projects that address a local need and result in enhanced social and economic outcomes for the wider community.



Chris Duley - Wanaaring

Chris Duley, 35, is a School Principal and will partner with Far West NSW Medicare Local to develop a local community garden. As Wanaaring's nearest grocery story is 200km away, the project aims to provide local families with a sustainable local supply of supply of fruit and vegetables. The community garden will include an outdoor work bench with a sink, a pizza oven and seating so that families can cook meals onsite and the space can be used as an alternative learning centre for school children.



David Ryan - Uralla

David Ryan, 29, is a Market Gardener and will partner with Uralla Neighbourhood Centre to further develop his local community garden. The project site will function as a learning centre and community hub, and will include a pond, temperature regulated seed storage room and greenhouse. The grant will also be utilized to buy an earth brick machine, which will be used for garden projects at local schools and aged care facilities. It is hoped the garden will be low maintenance, waterless and bio-diverse, and that it will produce nutritious food for disadvantaged groups and the wider community.



Helen De Costa - Braidwood

University student Helen De Costa, 19, will partner with Braidwood Showground Committee to replace the Show Cattle Yards at Braidwood Showground. The upgrade will allow for more livestock to be safely housed for judging during the Braidwood Show, and also aims to encourage use of the Showground for other community activities including Polocrosse, Pony Club, Rodeo and Camp Drafting.





Katie Rowe - Gulargambone

Katie Rowe, 29, is a teacher from Gulargambone Central School who will work with a project team of students to develop a natural play space for 0 to seven year olds in the courtyard of local community café 2828. The space will provide a safe, secure and educational place for children to play; as well as an opportunity for likeminded parents and grandparents to socialise and connect.



Megan Callow - Junee

Megan Callow, 29, is a member of the Junee Show Society Committee, Showgirl Organising Committee and Chief Steward of the Millinery section. Megan and the Junee Show Society will use the grant to upgrade the Belling Hall which will include lining and installing plaster ceilings and walls, and replacing the entrance with a ramp to make it more accessible for parents with children and those with disabilities. The upgrade will enable the hall to be used for more community functions, events and seminars, and will provide more space for Arts & Crafts exhibits during the Junee Show.



Paris Norton - Coonabarabran

Paris Norton, 23, is an Arts Administration Officer and will partner with Centacare Coonabarabran to run a weekly workshop titled 'Creation Point' where local women can come together to learn and practice traditional Indigenous weaving. As weaving is a highly regarded skill within the arts and retail market, the project aims to provide participants with the opportunity to use their new skill to produce quality pieces for sale, as well as encourage future workshops where weaving can be taught in schools, community organisations and at cultural events such as NAIDOC week.

RASF COMMUNITY KITCHEN DONATED BY MASTERS HOME IMPROVEMENT

Each year, a large scale kitchen is built to host cooking demonstrations at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. At the conclusion of the Show this large demonstration kitchen and its appliances are awarded to a rural and regional NSW community to reinvigorate a community facility. This year, for the very first time, the RAS Foundation was able to award two Community Kitchen Grants going to:

- Young Showground Trust
- Bingara Show Society



Young Showground Trust

Young is a thriving country town on the south western slopes of NSW. In 2014 an arson attack saw the Showground Trust's wonderful kitchen facility destroyed, with the fire also destroying the pavilion the kitchen was housed in. The community was devastated by the loss of this important facility that they had fundraised for many years to put in. Young will now rebuild their pavilion and receive a state of the art kitchen from the RAS Foundation to restore this facility at the centre of their community.

Bingara Show Society

Bingara is a small and vibrant town on the Gwydir River in northern NSW, 550 kms from Sydney. The Bingara Showground is the focal point for a community that has faced one of the worst droughts in more than 50 years. The showground was operating with a pre-1960 kitchen facility which was considerably out-dated and unable to meet the needs of the community. The new kitchen will complement the existing showground facilities and give Bingara the opportunity to encourage more community usage of their showground site.

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
