CONDITIONS OF ENTRY	<p>Exhibitors must adhere to the Conditions of Entry to Sydney Showground located at www.rasnsw.com.au, the General Regulations and the Special Sydney Royal Arts & Crafts Regulations in this Schedule (the "Regulations"), as they are bound by these terms.</p> <p>These documents constitute the whole agreement upon which Entries are submitted unless otherwise authorised by the RAS. A condition of entering into Competitions is strict adherence to the Regulations.</p> <p>The Exhibitor warrants that each article Exhibited by them or by their child/children/guardian is duly registered and either their property absolutely or is under their absolute care and control. The Exhibitor holds the RAS exempt from any liability in the event of any loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.</p> <p>The RAS has the power to evict any Exhibitor from the Showground in the event of a breach of the Conditions of Entry to Sydney Showground, General Regulations and/or the 2026 Sydney Royal Arts & Crafts Show Schedule.</p> <p>All refunds of Entry Fees are at the discretion of the RAS. A refund shall only be made if a withdrawal is submitted by 11:59pm on Thursday 29 January 2026 (Closing Day of Entry). To submit a withdrawal for an Exhibit, Exhibitors must log into their online Competition entry system account and select the Class they wish to withdraw from and complete the withdrawal process.</p>

INCORRECT AND INCOMPLETE APPLICATIONS FOR ENTRY	A Correction Fee of up to \$20 may be charged by the RAS, at its discretion, for each Application for Entry which is incorrect or incomplete. If an Application for Entry is not rectified in accordance with the RAS' requirements, the entry may not be accepted by the RAS.
CALCULATION OF AGE	The age of an Exhibitor is calculated as at the first day of the Show. Entry into Under 20s Classes is restricted to Exhibitors who have not attained the age of 20 years by the first day of the Show.
PRIZES AND GST	<p>The Australian Taxation Office has deemed that GST is payable on prizes if an Exhibitor is registered for GST and enters an Exhibit as part of a business enterprise.</p> <p>The information an Exhibitor provides on the Application for Entry determines whether GST is applicable.</p> <p><i>Any prize stated in this Schedule does not include GST.</i></p> <p>GST will not apply:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • if an Exhibitor enters an Exhibit as a hobby or private recreational pursuit; or • if an Exhibitor enters an Exhibit as part of a business enterprise, the Exhibitor has an ABN, but the Exhibitor is NOT REGISTERED for GST. • if an Exhibitor enters an Exhibit as part of a business enterprise the Exhibitor is not entitled to an ABN as the business or enterprise is not operating in Australia. <p>GST will apply:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • if an Exhibitor enters an Exhibit as part of a business enterprise, the Exhibitor has an ABN, and the Exhibitor is REGISTERED for GST. <p>Where GST applies, the RAS will pay the prize money quoted in this Schedule plus 10% GST. Failure to do so will result in the RAS deducting 47% of the successful Exhibitor's prize money as Pay As You Go Tax (PAYG). PAYMENT OF PRIZE MONEY	<p>Prize money won during the Sydney Royal Easter Show will be paid by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) to the bank account nominated for the Exhibitor in the competition entry system (myRAS) at the time the RAS commences processing a payment. If the bank details are incomplete or incorrect the RAS will attempt to contact the prize winners to confirm payment details.</p> <p>The RAS seeks to finalise all prize money payments by the end of June. Queries regarding unpaid prize money can be addressed to the Service Centre by email at competitions@rasnsw.com.au.</p> <p>Any prize money left unclaimed for a period in excess of six months, is deemed forfeited by the Exhibitor.</p>
EXHIBITS FOR SALE	<p>Exhibits entered in Classes 1 - 355 and Under 20's Classes 502, 503, 505, 507, 509, 510, and 512 (Artwork, Photography and Bee Blissed Special Section) may be offered for Sale by the Exhibitor. Exhibits entered in Classes 360 - 453, 500, 501, 504, 506, 508, 511 and 513 - 608 may not be offered for Sale by the Exhibitor.</p> <p>If an Exhibit is for sale, the Sale price must be over \$20 including GST, and must be clearly indicated on the Application for Entry. If an Exhibit entered in an eligible Class is not for sale, the letters 'NFS' must be clearly indicated on the Application for Entry.</p> <p>The RAS will charge a commission of 35% including GST for Exhibits from Classes 1 - 32, 502, 503, 505, 507 and 508 and a commission of 25% including GST for Exhibits from Classes 35 - 355 sold during the Show. The RAS will encourage the Sale of Exhibits while the Exhibition is in progress.</p> <p>NOTE: Changes to the Sale Status, price of Exhibits or the title of Exhibits will not be accepted online and/or via email or call after 5pm on Monday 16 February 2026.</p>
RESALE ROYALTY SCHEME	<p>The Government has engaged Copyright Agency Limited (www.copyright.com.au) to collect a 5% royalty from the second change of ownership of an artwork, to be paid to the original artist (other conditions apply).</p> <p>If an Exhibitor's artwork is sold (at the Easter Show or elsewhere), it is recommended the Exhibitor registers their Exhibit online at www.resaleroyalty.org.au so that <u>if the artwork is resold in the future</u> the Copyright Agency can pay the royalty collected to the artist.</p> <p>Because all artworks sold at the Easter Show are original artworks, a sale from the Exhibitor to the purchaser is the first sale of the artwork, not a re-sale under the Resale Royalty Scheme. Therefore, the RAS is not required to pay any royalties to the Copyright Agency or Exhibitor. Further information is available from both the websites detailed above.</p>
DELIVERY OF EXHIBITS IN PERSON	<p>Exhibitor Packs (which include identification labels, catalogue numbers, a delivery & collection slip, and delivery instructions) will be sent to Exhibitors approximately two (2) weeks prior to the delivery date.</p> <p>The Exhibit must have the identification label or catalogue number attached to it. AWARDS	<p>First, second, third and generally two highly commended Awards will be made at the discretion of the Judges. Prizes will be issued where appropriate.</p> <p>Only first prize winners in Art Classes 1 - 32 (Painting, Drawing, Print Making, Oriental Painting, Miniature Art, Photography, Digital Artwork, Miniature Sculpture, Ceramics & Pottery and Glass) will be notified by Friday 27 March 2026. These prizes along with the Frances Binnie Award, The RAS of NSW Art Prize and The Watt Family Perpetual Trophy will be announced prior to online results of other prize winners.</p> <p>All Awards, Product and Trophy Prizes may be collected during the Show by prior arrangement with the Arts & Crafts Coordinator or on collection dates.</p>
NON-SELECTED EXHIBITS	<p>Notification of non-selected Exhibits will be issued by Tuesday 31 March 2026.</p> <p>All Exhibits are selected to be displayed unless they are deemed 'Not According to Schedule (NAS)', Not Up to Standard (NUS), and/or we are unable to display due to restricted space.</p> <p>Non-selected Exhibits will be available for collection after the Show.</p>
PERPETUAL TROPHIES	<p>Perpetual Trophies remain the property of the Royal Agricultural Society of NSW. Ownership of the Trophy does not pass to the winning Exhibitor. A medallion will be presented to the annual winner whose name will be engraved on the Trophy.</p>
SUPPORTER PRIZES	<p>Prizes are provided by third parties and the RAS advises that any such Prize may be subject to change or amendment occurring at any time, thereby making the original information published incorrect.</p>
POPULAR CHOICE AWARDS	<p>A first prize of \$500 will be awarded to the artist whose Rural Subject and/or Landscape painting (Class 1) is voted Most Popular by public vote.</p> <p>A first prize of \$125 will be awarded to the Exhibitor whose Cake Decorating and Sugar Art entry (from Class 360 - 382, Class 575, and Class 576) is voted Most Popular by public vote.</p> <p>The ballots will commence with the Sydney Royal Arts Preview on Tuesday 31 March 2026 and run through the Show from Thursday 2 April 2026 until noon on Thursday 9 April 2026. Ballots will be online via a QR Code placed around the Pavilion.</p>
MOST SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITOR CALCULATION	<p>Prizes shall be determined as follows:</p> <p>Each 1st prize to count as 3 points; 2nd as 2 and 3rd as 1. The Exhibitor gaining the highest number of points will be the winner. In the event of two or more Exhibitors gaining an equal number of points, the Exhibitor gaining the greatest number of first places will be the winner. Should a tie still occur, the second, the third, and the Highly Commended prizes will be taken into consideration.</p>

ARTS & CRAFTS SPECIAL REGULATIONS

The following rules and Regulations apply to the Show:

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. The General Regulations apply to all Sections of the Show.
2. Copies of all Regulations are available from the Administration office at the Showground. General Regulations are also available at www.rasnsw.com.au.

ARTS & CRAFTS SPECIAL REGULATIONS

3. These Arts & Crafts Special Regulations apply to this Section only.
4. If there is any inconsistency between the General Regulations and these Arts & Crafts Special Regulations, the Arts & Crafts Special Regulations prevail.

EXHIBITOR RULES

5. Exhibitors must ensure that their entries are entered in the correct Class as transfers are only permitted at the discretion of the Committee.
6. Exhibitors will be allowed only one entry in any one Class unless otherwise specified.
7. Each Exhibit must be the work of the individual Exhibitor.
8. An Exhibit cannot be entered in more than one Class.
9. Works which have been accepted for Exhibition at a previous Sydney Royal Easter Show will not be eligible.
10. All Exhibits must have been completed within 18 months prior to the first judging day of the Show, except for Class 251.
11. Novice Classes are open only to Exhibitors who have not won a first prize in a similar Class within that category section, at a previous Sydney Royal Easter Show. This rule does not apply to Novice Classes in Cake Decorating and Sugar Art Master Classes, Western Calligraphy Classes, Lace Classes, or Wood Turning Classes.
12. Master Classes are open only to Exhibitors who have won a first prize in an open Class at a previous Sydney Royal Easter Show, in that Category section, except for Cake Decorating and Sugar Art Master Classes.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

13. Soiled or damaged work will not be accepted.
14. No factory-made goods will be allowed unless otherwise specified.
15. Except where otherwise specified, articles may have seams and hems machine sewn, but all decorative work must be handwork.
16. Exhibits intended for display only will not be received.
17. An identification label will be posted to all Exhibitors approximately two weeks prior to the Show. These labels must be visible on delivery of Exhibits.
18. No extra props to be submitted except where otherwise specified.
19. Miniature Sculpture, Pottery, and Glass identification labels must be visible on arrival, having been attached to the Exhibit.
20. At the discretion of the Committee or Judges, Exhibits considered not up to an appropriate standard will not be displayed.
21. Notices will not be allowed on any Exhibits except where required in a particular Class.
22. Should entries be so numerous that available space is not sufficient to display all entries, the Committee reserves the right to display sufficient only for the purpose.

DISPLAY AND SALE

23. Entries which are displayed must remain on Exhibition for the full period of the Show.
24. Entry Fees for those not displayed will not be refunded.
25. Exhibits cannot be withdrawn from Sale once the published cut-off date has been reached.
26. The RAS may allow reproduction of prize-winning works to the media during the period of Exhibition.
27. All Perishable Cookery entries submitted will become the property of the RAS and will not be returned to Exhibitors.
28. Exhibits (except Cake Decorating, Sugar Art, and Cookery items) offered for Sale must have the price clearly indicated on the Application for Entry form. The letters NFS must be used if the Exhibit is Not For Sale. The RAS will encourage the Sale of Exhibits while the Exhibition is in progress.
29. The RAS will charge a commission of 35% including GST for Exhibits from Classes 1-32, 502, 503, 505, 507 and 508 (Painting, Drawing, Print Making, Miniature Art, Photography, Sculpture, Ceramics & Pottery, Glass, Under 20's Artwork, Photography and Bee Blissed Special Section) and a commission of 25% including GST for Exhibits from Classes 35-355 sold during the Show.

PROTEST PROCEDURES

30. An Exhibitor, Attendant, or Competitor may enter a protest against any decision, act, or omission on the part of a Judge, the RAS, or any Official of the RAS in connection with the judging of a Class.
31. A protest must be in writing, set out the circumstances relied upon, and be accompanied by a fee of \$100. This amount shall be forfeited to the RAS if the protest is not upheld.
32. Protests must be lodged to the Arts & Crafts, Flower & Garden and Honey Events Manager by noon on the first Wednesday of the Show.
33. Protests will be heard and determined by the Arts & Crafts Committee or Chairman of that Committee or Council at the upcoming Committee Meeting after Show.
34. Upon hearing and determining a protest, those hearing the protest may take and act upon such evidence as they think fit, regardless of the ordinary rules of evidence.
35. The determination of a protest is final and binding upon all parties, and there is no right of appeal.

ARTS & CRAFTS SPECIAL REGULATIONS (cont.)

COMPETITION ELIGIBILITY

36. A condition of entering into Competitions is strict adherence to the Regulations.
37. Applications for Entry in the name of deceased Person(s) are not eligible for entry, as are any applications deemed unauthorised by the RAS.
38. For the purposes of this Agreement, "Disability" has the meaning given in section 4(1) of the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (Cth)*, and includes:
 - (a) total or partial loss of the person's bodily or mental functions; or
 - (b) total or partial loss of a part of the body; or
 - (c) the presence in the body of organisms causing disease or illness; or
 - (d) the presence in the body of organisms capable of causing disease or illness; or
 - (e) the malfunction, malformation or disfigurement of a part of the person's body; or
 - (f) a disorder or malfunction that results in the person learning differently from a person without the disorder or malfunction; or
 - (g) a disorder, illness or disease that affects a person's thought processes, perception of reality, emotions or judgment or that results in disturbed behaviour;

—and includes a disability that:

 - (h) presently exists; or
 - (i) previously existed but no longer exists; or
 - (j) may exist in the future (including because of a genetic predisposition to that disability); or
 - (k) is imputed to a person.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. CONDITIONS OF ENTRY TO SYDNEY SHOWGROUND

Exhibitors must adhere to the Conditions of Entry to Sydney Showground located at www.rasnsw.com.au, the General Regulations and the Arts & Craft Special Regulations in this Schedule (the "Regulations"), as they are bound by these terms.

The RAS has the power to evict any Exhibitor from the Showground in the event of a breach of the Conditions of Entry to Sydney Showground, General Regulations and/or the 2026 Sydney Royal Arts & Crafts Show Schedule.

2. WORKPLACE SURVEILLANCE ACT

The RAS operates surveillance cameras from Sydney Showground Security, and these are located in and around facilities requiring security monitoring for the safety or security of individuals or property. The RAS also has access to Sydney Olympic Park security cameras and vice versa. Please note that security camera monitoring is continuous and ongoing, and it is deemed that a Person, by entering the Showground, consents to this photographing, filming, or taping. The RAS strictly complies with the Workplace Surveillance Act 2005 (NSW).

3. WORKING WITH CHILDREN

2. Participants are required to bring their ID labels along with their Exhibits on the delivery day. Assistance will be provided by Arts & Crafts Officials to attach the labels to the base or presentation board.
3. Exhibits that do not meet the specified requirements will be disqualified and marked as "Not According to Schedule."
4. Cakes that are structurally unsound will not be accepted. Dummies/polystyrene blocks strongly recommended.
5. Unless specified for a particular Class, manufactured ornaments are not permitted.
6. Cutting of cakes is strictly prohibited.
7. Dummy cakes are allowed as long as the same shape can be replicated using actual cake. Only dummy cakes are allowed in Class 372, Buttercream.
8. Wire insertion is not allowed in any cake or dummy. However, in Sugar Art Classes where no cake is involved, wire usage is permissible.
9. Fondant covering is to be used in all cake entries except in Class 372 where only Butter Cream is to be used. Chocolate, fresh fruit and toffee should not be used in any Class.
10. Tulle, fabric, ribbons, cotton braid, manufactured stamens are permitted. Natural fine stems are not allowed. Wafer and rice paper may only be used in small quantity.
11. All items must be sugar based and no cold porcelain items will be acceptable in any Cake Decorating and Sugar Art Classes.
12. Hobby glue is not allowed for attaching sugar work in any Cake Decorating and Sugar Art Classes. Edible glue should be used for all sugar work.
13. In all Classes, icing, paper, and fabric, in conjunction with edible food products like sugar, polenta, gelatine, coconut, cashews and piping gel, may be used as a board covering.
14. Edible food products such as sugar, coconut, piping gel, tea leaves, coffee and royal icing may be used on 'cake' entries and boards.
15. A TECHNICAL INFORMATION SHEET must be provided with each entry, indicating the materials and techniques used. These sheets are included in the Exhibitor Pack and must be completed before delivery.
16. Edible food colours, lustres, glitters, including metallic colours, may be used where appropriate.
17. Baseboards or presentation boards that come into contact with the exhibition case or surface must be fitted with cleats (supports/feet attached to the underside of the board) that raise it at least 5mm for ease of handling.
18. A tier is defined as two or more levels, not necessarily arranged one above the other but linked by a common board.
19. Only food-grade supports are allowed to be used in all Classes except in Sugar Art Classes where wire is also permitted. The Technical Information Sheet must provide details of any internal and external supports used. Food-grade refers to materials that do not contain toxins or dangerous substances and do not break down when in contact with other substances.
20. Classes 362, 371, and 376 allow the use of manufactured pillars, including wooden skewers, or other means to elevate cakes.
21. In Classes 378, 379, and 380, manufactured articles such as vases, material and ornaments may be used in presentation.
22. Size restrictions for entries are specified under individual Classes. Measurements should be taken from the tabletop, after adding any cleats, fabrics, or materials to the board. All boards are measured across the front of the tabletop.
23. If an Exhibitor has won 1st prize at two previous Sydney Royal Easter Shows in Open Wedding Cake (Class 371), Open Special Occasion Cake (Class 366) or Open Arrangement of Flowers (Class 380), they must move to the Master Section for these Classes. Master Exhibitors may still enter Open Classes other than 371, 366, and 380.
24. The Arts & Crafts Committee acknowledges the use of different manufactured items and tolerances in cooking and display aids, such as cake tins, boards, and pans.

60g self-raising flour	90g chopped blanched almonds
90g chopped red glace cherries	half teaspoon of almond essence
half teaspoon of ground cloves	half teaspoon of ground ginger
half teaspoon of lemon essence or finely grated lemon rind	half teaspoon of vanilla essence
quarter teaspoon grated nutmeg	third of a cup of sherry or brandy

METHOD:

1. Mix all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave at least one hour, but preferably overnight.
2. Sift together the flours and spices.
3. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.
4. Place the mixture into a prepared square 20cm x 20cm (8" x 8") tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately three and a half to four hours.
5. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size, it is suggested the raisins be snipped into two or three pieces, cherries into four to six pieces and almonds crosswise into three to four pieces.

2 teaspoons cinnamon
2 teaspoons ginger

FLAX EGG

1 tablespoon ground flax seed or powder

1 teaspoon psyllium husks

3 tablespoons water

These ingredients are combined in a small container until moist and thickened. Set aside but do not allow to become too thick.

Note: This mixture should be made just prior to making the cake.

METHOD:

1. Grease and line a deep loaf tin (22cm x 14cm x 7 cm)
2. Preheat the oven to 150°C or 300°F
3. Combine all the sugar, oil, honey, water, self-raising Gluten free flour (sifted with the bicarbonate of soda and the spices)
4. Add the flax egg mixture and using a whisk combine all the ingredients
5. The mixture should be quite moist and soft.
6. Pour into the prepared tin and place into the oven (150°C) for 45-50 minutes.
7. Test with a cake skewer; once cooked the cake will be moist and spongy. Flavour improves on standing.

Some of the trophies currently competed for were first won in 1911. Winners of Perpetual Trophies are permanently honoured, taking their place alongside past winners and becoming part of the ongoing tradition of the RAS.
