Exhibits must be in position and ready for judging not later than 8.30 a.m., Tuesday, 8th April. Judging to commence at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, 8th April.

REGULATIONS FOR THE COMMONWEALTH DISTRICT COMPETITION.

- The Society's By-laws, with these Regulations, will govern this Competition.
- For the Best Collection of Exhibits from Districts as defined in the following Regulations:—

PRIZES: £500.

In addition, £100 will be given for each District Competing.

To be divided in proportion to the number of points awarded to each exhibit by the Judges. Any collection securing fewer than 1400 points will not be entitled to an award.

ORGANISING EXPENSES.

- The sum of £275 for organising purposes (in addition to Prize Money) will be paid to each competing district.
- A Shield, value £50, is offered for this Competition. The winner of Competition each year to have name engraved on Shield, and hold same for year. Shield to be returned to the Royal Agricultural Society seven days before the succeeding Show.

ENTRY FEE, 5s.

5. Collections may consist of all or any of the articles mentioned in Clauses 1 to 11 of the Scale of Points hereinafter set out. NO EXHIBITS OTHER THAN THOSE ENUMERATED IN THE SCALE OF POINTS SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE COLLECTION. All produce must have been raised during the current season, or during the immediately preceding season.

6. All exhibits will be ineligible for competition in the general classes. Exhibitors wishing to compete in open classes must forward a separate exhibit, and enter such exhibit in the usual manner with the Secretary of the Society.

7. All exhibits of Hay, Chaff, Corn, etc., must be in the following quantities, viz.:—Cereals, not less than 2 bushel; Maize, not less than 2 bushel and 3 Cobs; Chaff, bag (56lb.); Fodder (including Hay), half-bale pressed (Commercial), approximately 24in. x 18in. x 12in. or bundle; Vegetables and Roots, other than Peas, Beans, and Lettuce, about 10lb. of each variety. Peas, Beans, and Lettuce, about 5lb. of each variety. Silage, not more than six varieties, container equivalent to a butter box or kerosene tin of each variety to be shown.

8. Fresh Fruit will be judged in a similar manner to that in the Open Classes.

9. All exhibits are to be sent by the cheapest railway or steamship route at the cost and under the direction of the Royal Agricultural Society. The exhibits of each District are to be sent in one lot as far as possible, and ALL EXHIBITS ARE TO BE CERTIFIED BY THE SECRETARIES OF THE CONTRIBUTING SOCIETIES TO SUCH DISTRICT COLLECTION. The Consignment Note must be endorsed "For District Exhibit." Every parcel or package bearing the District Label will be carried to Sydney free of rail charges. Any parcel or package NOT BEARING THE DISTRICT LABEL must be sent carriage prepaid and NO REFUND WILL BE MADE by the Society of the amount so paid. EXHIBITS FOR INDIVIDUAL CLASSES IN THE AGRICULTURAL SECTION MUST NOT BE CONSIGNED WITH THOSE FOR THE DISTRICT EXHIBIT.

10. All collections must be in charge of a responsible member or nominee of the Societies exhibiting same, who will have to arrange and display the exhibit to the best advantage.

11. No exhibitor or person representing a District shall address any Judge while the latter is judging. All explanations must be supplied to the Stewards in every case. No Steward shall consult with the Judge or offer any advice or suggestion in respect to the number of points to be allotted in any case. During judging no person shall be admitted to the Courts except the Judges, Stewards, and Delegate or Delegates appointed by the District to explain any details which may be considered necessary by the Stewards.

12. WHEN THE JUDGES CONSIDER THAT ANY EXHIBIT OR ANY PORTION THEREOF DOES NOT POSSESS SUFFICIENT MERIT, OR CANNOT BE GROWN COMMERCIALY IN THE DISTRICT EXHIBITING IT, THEY SHALL HAVE FULL POWER TO EXCLUDE SAME FROM THE POINTS AWARDED.

13. The judges have full power to obtain through, but not from, the Stewards such expert assistance as they think fit.

14. The judges shall be requested to return to the Courts the day after judging for the purpose of explaining the allocation of points.

15. All exhibits must be the bona fide production of the District exhibiting same. Any District committing a breach of this regulation will be liable to disqualification.

16. The Society will erect all stands required in the Courts for the display of the Sections of the Exhibits. A map (about 8ft. square) of the State in which the District is situated, with the District's area marked thereon, will also be provided by the Society, and must be displayed on the back wall of each Court. The organisers MUST send plans of their Courts to the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society the first day of February immediately preceding the Show. Otherwise the Organisers must use the Stands in their Courts used by them at the last Show. THE COURTS WILL BE ERECTED BY THE SOCIETY AND MAY BE DECORATED BY EXHIBITORS WITH PASTORAL OR AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS OF THE DISTRICT, WHICH PRODUCTS MUST COME WITHIN THE SCALE OF POINTS FOR THE COMPETITION. EXHIBITS USED FOR DECORATIONS SHALL NOT BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION BY THE JUDGES IN AWARDED SECTIONAL POINTS, BUT POINTS WILL BE ALLOTTED UNDER THE HEADING OF ATTRACTIVENESS OF GENERAL DECORATIONS. Where sheaves of hay or other produce used for decorative purposes cannot be conveniently inspected by the judge a sufficient portion of such exhibit must be in a position where it can be readily examined.

17. For the purpose of this Competition the State of N.S.W. is nominally divided into nine districts, comprising the undermentioned groups of Societies. Exhibits from districts in other States are eligible to compete, such districts to be those recognised by the leading Society of the State represented.

18. The judges are instructed to award points in such sub-sections as Dairy Produce without regard to the number of establishments producing such products. As an instance, providing that it is shown that the District is producing butter on a commercial scale, points shall not be deducted because the product exhibited is from one factory only.

19. Wool exhibits must have been procured from at least 10 breeders, the names of whom must be displayed on the Wool at the completion of judging.

20. The boundaries of the Societies now exhibiting as Districts shall be the recognised boundaries of such For Districts not at present exhibiting the Societies as grouped in these rules are to be taken merely as a guide to the portions of the States the products from which can be appropriately grouped. Societies or Organisers of District Societies Exhibits are invited to consult the Secretary on this matter. The District Organisers are advised that in the event of any dispute between two Districts as to the produce of any part it should be referred to the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W.

ROSTER FOR DISTRICT EXHIBITS.

It has been decided to limit the number of exhibiting Districts to five (5). The Council reserves the right to require one or two Districts scoring the lowest number of points to stand out of the following competition. Entries should be guaranteed not later than 1st June for the succeeding competition.
