All exhibits of Hey, Chaff, Corn, etc., must be in the following quantities, via:—Cereals, not less than a bushel; Malic, not less than a bushel and 2 Cobe; Chaff, beg (56lb.); Fodder (including Hay), half-bals pressed (Commercial), approximately 24in x 18in x 12in or bundle; Vegetables and Roots, other than Peas, Beans, and Lettnee, about 10lb, of each variety. Peas, Henns, and Lettnee, about 5lb of each variety. Hinge, not more than six varieties, container equivalent to a butter box or kerosene tin of each variety to be shown.
 - 8. Fresh Fruit will be judged in a similar manner to that in the Open Classes.
- 9. All exhibits are to be sent by the chespect railway or steamship route at the cost and under the direction of the Royal agricultural Seciety. The exhibits of each District are to be sent in one lot as far as possible, and ALL EXHIBITS ARE TO BE CERTIFIED BY THE RECRETARIES OF THE CONTRIBUTING SOCIETIES TO SUCH DISTRICT COLLECTION The Consignment Note unust be endorsed "For District Exhibit." Every parcel or package bearing the District Label will be carried to Sydney free of rail charges. Any parcel or package NOT BEARING THE DISTRICT LABEL must be sent carriage prepaid and SO REFUND WILL BE MADE by the Society of the amount so paid. EXHIBITS FOR INDIVIDUAL CLASSES IN THE AGRICULTURAL SECTION MUST NOT BE CONSIGNED WITH THOSE FOR THE DISTRICT EXHIBIT.
- 10 All collections must be in charge of a responsible member or nominee of the Societies exhibiting same, who will have to arrange and display the exhibit to the best advantage.
- 11 No exhibitor or person representing a District shall address any Judge while the latter is judging. All explanations must be supplied to the Stewards in every case. No Steward shall consult with the Judge or offer any advice or suggestion in respect to the number of points to be allotted in any case. During judging no person shall be admitted to the Courts except the Judges. Stewards, and Delegate appointed by the District to explain any details which may be considered necessary by the Stewards.
- 12. WHEN THE JUDGES CONSIDER THAT ANY EXHIBIT OF ANY PORTION THEREOF DOES NOT POSSESS SUFFICIENT MERIT, OR CANNOT BE GROWN COMMERCIALLY IN THE DISTRICT EXHIBITING IT. THEY SHALL HAVE FULL POWER TO EXCLUDE SAME FROM THE POINTS AWARDED.
- 13. The judges have full power to obtain through, but not from, the Stewards such expert assistance as they think fit.
- 14. The judges shall be requested to return to the Courte the day efter judging for the purpose of explaining the allocation of points
- 15. All exhibits must be the bone fide production of the District exhibiting same. Any District committing a breach of this regulation will be liable to disqualification.
- The Society will erect all stands required in the Courts for the display of the Sections of the Exhibita. A map (about 8ft. equare) of the State in which the District is situated, with the District's area marked thereon, will also be provided by the Sectety, and must be displayed on the back wall of each Court. The organisers MUST send plans of their Courts to the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society the first day of February immediately preceding the Show. Otherwise the Organisers must use the Stands in their Courts used by them at the last Show. THE COURTS WILL BE ERECTED BY THE SOCIETY AND MAY BE DECORATED BY EXHIBITORS WITH PASTORAL OR AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS OF THE DISTRICT, WHICH PRODUCTS MUST COME WITHIN THE SCALE OF POINTS FOR THE COMPETITION EXHIBITED. THE DISTRICT, WHICH PRODUCTS MUST COME WITHIN THE INTO CONSIDERATION BY THE JUDGES IN AWARDING SECTIONAL POINTS, BUT POINTS WILL BE ALLOTTED UNDER THE HEADING OF ATTRACTIVENESS OF GENERAL DECORATIONS. Where sheeves of hay or ether produce used for decorative purposes cannot be conveniently inspected by the judge a sufficient portion of such exhibit must be in a position where it can be readily examined.
- 17. For the purpose of this Competition the State of N.S.W. is nominally divided into nine districts, comprising the undermentioned groups of Societies. Exhibits from districts in other States are eligible to compete, each districts to be those recognised by the leading Society of the State represented.
- 16. The judges are instructed to award points in such subsections as Dairy Produce without regard to the number of establishments producing such products. As an instance, providing that it is shown that the District is producing butter on a commercial scale, points shall not be deducted because the product exhibited is from une factory only.

The District Organisers are advised that in the event of any dispute between two Districts as to the produce of any part it should be referred to the Socretary of the Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W.
