3. The sum of £500 for organising purposes (in addition to Prize Money) will be paid to each competing district.

4. A Shield, value £50, is offered for this Competition. The winner of the Competition each year to have name engraved on Shield, and hold same for year. Shield to be returned to the Royal Agricultural Society seven days before the succeeding Show.

ENTRY FEE, 5s.

5. Collections may consist of all or any of the articles mentioned in Clauses 1 to 11 of the Scale of points hereinafter set out. NO EXHIBITS OTHER THAN THOSE ENUMERATED IN THE SCALE OF POINTS SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE COLLECTION. All produce must have been raised during the current season, or during the immediately preceding season.

6. All exhibits will be ineligible for competition in the general classes. Exhibitors wishing to compete in open classes must forward a separate exhibit, and enter such exhibit in the usual manner with the Secretary of the Society.

7. All exhibits, wheat excepted, will be judged in a similar manner to that in the Open Classes.

8. All exhibits are to be sent by the cheapest railway or steamship route at the cost and under the direction of the Royal Agricultural Society. The exhibits of each District are to be sent in one lot as far as possible, and ALL EXHIBITS ARE TO BE CERTIFIED BY THE SECRETARIES OF THE CONTRIBUTING SOCIETIES TO SUCH DISTRICT COLLECTION. The Consignment Note must be endorsed "For District Exhibit." Every parcel or package bearing the District Label will be carried to Sydney free of rail charges. Any parcel or package NOT BEARING THE DISTRICT LABEL must be sent carriage prepaid and NO REFUND WILL BE MADE by the Society of the amount so paid. EXHIBITS FOR INDIVIDUAL CLASSES IN THE AGRICULTURAL SECTION MUST NOT BE CONSIGNED WITH THOSE FOR THE DISTRICT EXHIBIT.

9. All collections must be in charge of a responsible member or nominee of the Societies exhibiting same, who will have to arrange and display the exhibits to the best advantage.

10. No exhibitor or person representing a District shall address any Judge while the latter is judging. All explanations must be supplied to the Stewards in every case. No Steward shall consult with the Judge or offer any advice or suggestion in respect to the number of points to be allotted in any case. During judging no person shall be admitted to the Courts except the Judges, Stewards, and Delegate or Delegates appointed by the District to explain any details which may be considered necessary by the Stewards.

11. The judges shall be requested to return to the Courts the day after judging for the purpose of explaining the allocation of points. An exhibitor shall only be awarded one prize in any one class.

12. WHEN A JUDGE CONSIDERS THAT ANY EXHIBIT OR ANY PORTION THEREOF DOES NOT POSSESS SUFFICIENT MERIT, OR CANNOT BE GROWN COMMERCIALY IN THE DISTRICT EXHIBITING IT HE SHALL REPORT SAME TO THE STEWARD-IN-CHIEF WHO WILL ARRANGE FOR SUITABLE ACTION TO BE TAKEN.

13. The judges have full power to obtain through, but not from, the Stewards such expert assistance as they think fit.

14. All exhibits must be the bona fide production of the District exhibiting same. Any District committing a breach of this regulation will be liable to disqualification.

15. The Society will erect all stands required in the Courts for the display of the Sections of the Exhibits. The Organisers MUST send plans of their Courts to the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society the first day of February immediately preceding the Show. Otherwise the Organisers must use the Stands in their Court used by them at the last Show. THE COURTS WILL BE ERECTED BY THE SOCIETY AND MAY BE DECORATED BY EXHIBITORS WITH PASTORAL OR AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS OF THE DISTRICT, WHICH PRODUCTS MUST COME WITHIN THE SCALE OF POINTS FOR THE COMPETITION. EXHIBITS USED FOR DECORATIONS SHALL NOT BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION BY THE JUDGES IN AWARDED SECTIONAL POINTS, BUT POINTS WILL BE ALLOTTED UNDER THE HEADING OF ATTRACTIVENESS OF GENERAL DECORATIONS. Where sheaves of hay or other produce used for decorative purposes cannot be conveniently inspected by the judge a sufficient portion of such exhibit must be in a position where it can be readily examined.

16. For the purpose of this Competition the State of N.S.W. is nominally divided into nine districts, comprising the undermentioned groups of Societies. Exhibits from districts in other States are eligible to compete, such districts to be those recognised by the leading Society of the State represented.

17. The boundaries of the Societies now exhibiting as Districts shall be the recognised boundaries of such. For Districts not at present exhibiting the Societies as grouped in these rules are to be taken merely as a guide to the portions of the States the products from which can be appropriately grouped. Societies or Organisers of District Societies' Exhibits are invited to consult the Secretary on this matter. French Beans.—Pods should be fresh and young with no pronounced development of the seeds ; of good colour ; straight (compatible with the variety) ; fleshy, tender and brittle. Pods should be uniform in size, and should not be mis-shapen or over mature.

Cucumber.—(Long green type).—Should be of good shape, young, desirably straight (absence of marked spindling), firm and crisp, with a clear skin and the bloom present. The pulp should constitute the greater portion of the cucumber. Faults are sponginess, staleness and over maturity, characterised by loss of colour.

Cucumber.—(Apple shape).—Should be firm, young and crisp. The pulp should constitute the greater portion of the cucumber. Faults are sponginess, staleness and over maturity, characterised by loss of colour.

Peas.—The pods should be of uniform size and maturity; young and well filled with large tender peas. The peas should be of good flavour, desirably sweet, and of a uniform dark-green colour.

Potatoes.—Should be uniform in size, shape and general appearance. The tubers should be medium size (not too large) and with shallow eyes. Of good internal quality as determined by the cut. Defects are presence of greening, damage by insect pests and diseases, second growth, flecking, hollow heart.

Pumpkin.—Should be mature and possess good internal colour; deep, firm and finely grained flesh. Should be solid and weighty. The specimens should be exhibited with a small portion of the stem attached. Defects are over maturity, presence of "bone," pale flesh.

Squash.—Exhibits should possess a clean, smooth skin, small seed cavity with a well developed flesh. They should be young. Over-maturity is a defect.

Tomatoes.—Should be uniform in size, shape and appearance, possessing clean, unblemished skin. Fruit should be evenly ripened, of good colour and flavour, and having a minimum of core. They should be firm, free from puffiness, with a complete absence of cracking. Flesh should be thick, both of outer walls and sections. Defects are presence of cracking, blemishes due to insect pests, diseases, weather, large core.

For purposes of identification a label, bearing the full name of the exhibitor (Factory) together with full particulars of the class for which the exhibit is intended, must be securely affixed to the lid of each box before it is wrapped in its protecting cover.

The surface of the butter must be impressed with the Australian Roller brand.

An exhibitor who may desire to go through the exhibits with the judge, after judging day, shall make an appointment through the Steward-in-Chief or the Secretary.

Arrival and Departure of Exhibits.

Butter for classes as hereunder mentioned must be addressed to the Secretary, Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W., Waterdale Cold Stores Pty., Ltd., 10 Point-st., Pyrmont, Sydney, and be delivered not later than the dates shown, viz. —
