Judging to commence at 2 p.m., Friday, 31st March, with non-perishable exhibits, and at 8 a.m., Saturday, 1st April, with perishable exhibits. The Agricultural Hall shall be open to the Public at 2 p.m., Saturday, 1st April.

REGULATIONS FOR THE COMMONWEALTH DISTRICT COMPETITION.

- The Society's By-laws, with these Regulations, will govern this Competition.
- For the Best Collection of Exhibits from Districts as defined in the following Regulations:—

PRIZES: £500.

In addition, £100 will be given for each District Competing.

To be divided in proportion to the percentage of points gained by each exhibit. Any collection securing fewer than 1400 points will not be entitled to an award.

ORGANISING EXPENSES

- The sum of £500 for organising purposes (in addition to Prize Money) will be paid to each competing district.
- A Shield, value £50, is offered for this Competition. The winner of the Competition each year to have name engraved on Shield and hold same for year. Shield to be returned to the Royal Agricultural Society seven days before the succeeding Show.

ENTRY FEE, 5s

5. Collections may consist of all or any of the articles mentioned in Clauses 1 to 11 of the Scale of Points hereinafter set out. NO EXHIBITS OTHER THAN THOSE ENUMERATED IN THE SCALE OF POINTS SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE COLLECTION. Condiments to be in bottles or glass jars. Preserves or like exhibits in tins are not eligible. All produce must have been raised during the current season, or during the immediately preceding season.

6. All exhibits will be ineligible for competition in the general classes. Exhibitors wishing to compete in open classes must forward a separate exhibit, and enter such exhibit in the usual manner with the Secretary of the Society.

7. All exhibits, wheat excepted, will be judged in a similar manner to that in the Open Classes.

8. All exhibits are to be sent by the cheapest railway or steamship route at the cost and under the direction of the Royal Agricultural Society. The exhibits of each District are to be sent in one lot as far as possible, and ALL EXHIBITS ARE TO BE CERTIFIED BY THE SECRETARIES OF THE CONTRIBUTING SOCIETIES TO SUCH DISTRICT COLLECTION. The Consignment Note must be endorsed "For District Exhibit." Every parcel or package bearing the District Label will be carried to Sydney free of rail charges. Any parcel or package NOT BEARING THE DISTRICT LABEL must be sent carriage prepaid and NO REFUND WILL BE MADE by the Society of the amount so paid. EXHIBITS FOR INDIVIDUAL CLASSES IN THE AGRICULTURAL SECTION MUST NOT BE CONSIGNED WITH THOSE FOR THE DISTRICT EXHIBIT. Perishable exhibits consigned by passenger train must be endorsed "Non-Competitive Exhibit" then state the name of the district exhibit. Refer to Coaching Rate Book, page 113, Clause 9.

9. All collections must be in charge of a responsible member or nominee of the Societies exhibiting same, who will have to arrange and display the exhibit to the best advantage.

10. No exhibitor or person representing a District shall address any Judge while the latter is judging. All explanations must be supplied to the Stewards in every case. No Steward shall consult with the Judge or offer any advice or suggestion in respect to the number of points to be allotted in any case. During judging no person shall be admitted to the Courts except the Judges, Stewards, and Delegate or Delegates appointed by the District to explain any details which may be considered necessary by the Stewards.

11. The judges shall be requested to return to the Courts the day after judging for the purpose of explaining the allocation of points. An exhibitor shall only be awarded one prize in any one class.

12. WHEN A JUDGE CONSIDERS THAT ANY EXHIBIT OR ANY PORTION THEREOF DOES NOT POSSESS SUFFICIENT MERIT, OR CANNOT BE GROWN COMMERCIALY IN THE DISTRICT EXHIBITING IT HE SHALL REPORT SAME TO THE STEWARD-IN-CHIEF WHO WILL ARRANGE FOR SUITABLE ACTION TO BE TAKEN.

13. The judges have full power to obtain through, but not from, the Stewards such expert assistance as they think fit.

14. All exhibits must be the bona fide production of the District exhibiting same. Any District committing a breach of this regulation will be liable to disqualification.

15. The Society will erect all stands required in the Courts for the display of the Sections of the Exhibits. The Organisers MUST send plans of their Courts to the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society the first day of October immediately preceding the Show. Otherwise the Organisers must use the Stands in their Court used by them at the last Show. THE COURTS WILL BE ERECTED BY THE SOCIETY AND MAY BE DECORATED BY EXHIBITORS WITH PASTORAL OR AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS OF THE DISTRICT, WHICH PRODUCTS MUST COME WITHIN THE SCALE OF POINTS FOR THE COMPETITION. EXHIBITS USED FOR DECORATIONS SHALL NOT BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION BY THE JUDGES IN AWARDING SECTIONAL POINTS, BUT POINTS WILL BE ALLOTTED UNDER THE HEADING OF ATTRACTIVENESS OF GENERAL DECORATIONS. Where sheaves of hay or other produce used for decorative purposes cannot be conveniently inspected by the Judge a sufficient portion of such exhibit must be in a position where it can be readily examined.

16. For the purpose of this Competition the State of N.S.W. is nominally divided into four districts. See page 564 for map showing District Boundaries. Exhibits from districts in other States are eligible to compete, such districts to be those recognised by the leading Society of the State represented.

ROSTER FOR DISTRICT EXHIBITS.

It has been decided to limit the number of exhibiting Districts to five (5). The Council reserves the right to require one or two Districts scoring the lowest number of points to stand out of the following competition. Entries should be guaranteed not later than 1st June for the succeeding competition.

SCALE OF POINTS USED IN THE JUDGING OF EXHIBITS

Each District Exhibit Committee may, subject to the approval of the Society, eliminate from the scale of judging points any commodity or commodities for which the judging points shall not exceed approximately 135. The whole of a Section or portion of same (Nos. 1 to 11) or the whole of a Sub-section may be included in the elimination but any elimination shall not include portion of a Sub-section. The commodity or commodities eliminated shall be restricted to those not generally commercially grown in the district. A list of all commodities proposed to be eliminated must be furnished to the Society not later than 28th February each year for approval or otherwise. In consequence of this provision the competition shall be decided upon the highest percentage of points gained by the commodities exhibited in the respective Courts.

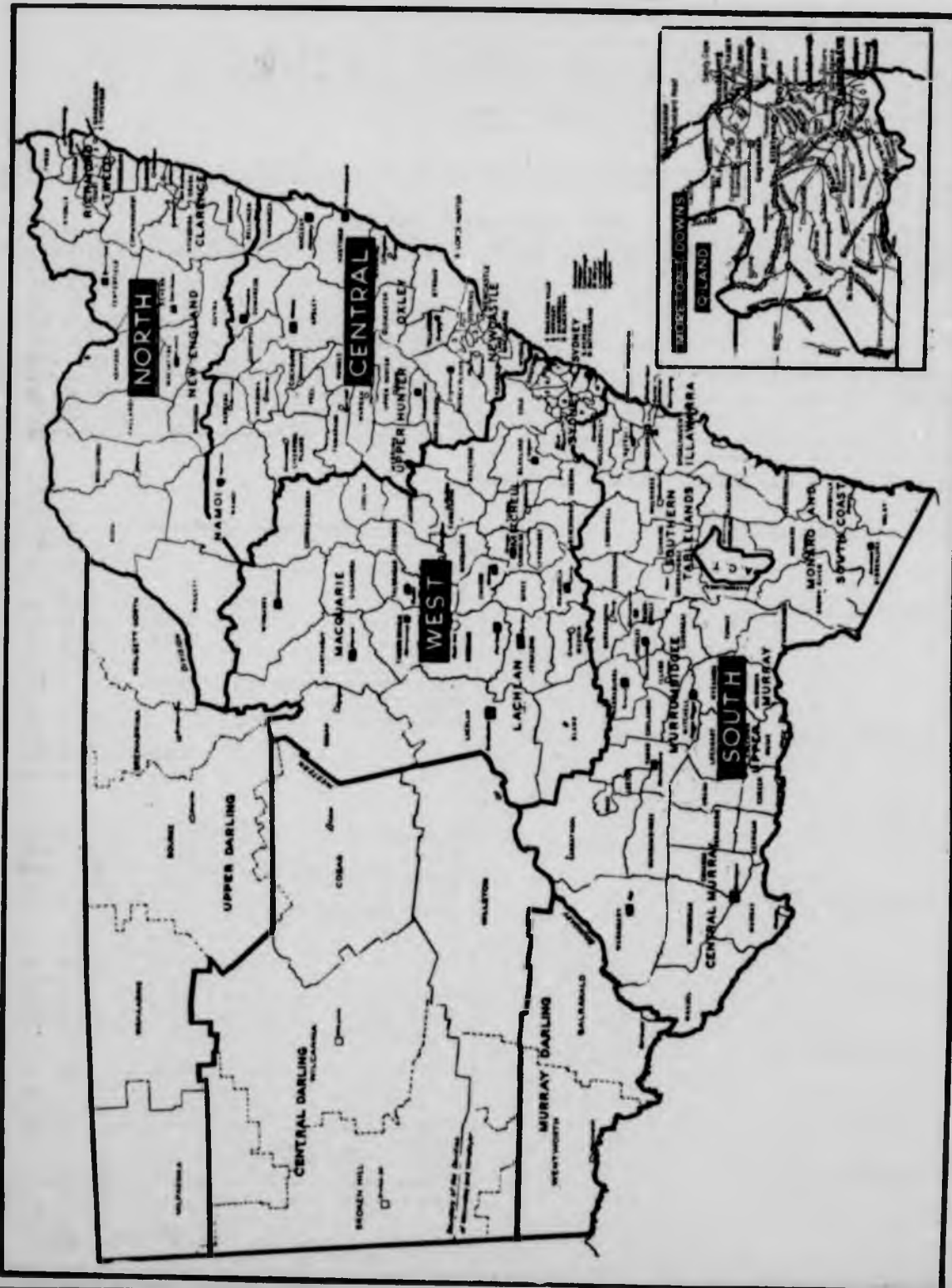

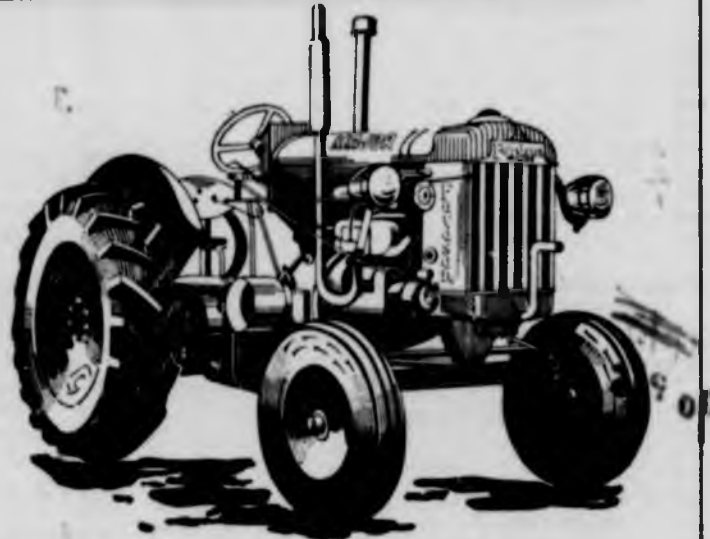

The surface of the butter must be impressed with the Australian Roller brand.
An exhibitor who may desire to go through the exhibits with the judge, after judging day, shall make an appointment through the Steward-in-Chief or the Secretary.

Arrival and Departure of Exhibits.

Butter for classes as hereunder mentioned must be addressed to the Secretary, Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W., Waterside Cold Stores Pty. Ltd., 10 Point-st., Pyrmont, Sydney, and be delivered not later than the dates shown, viz:—
Class 3—Saturday, 7th January. Class 7—During March.
Classes 4 and 5—Wednesday, 25th January. Class 8—Friday, 24th February.
Class 6—Wednesday, 25th January. Class 9—Wednesday 22nd March.
For Class 10, butter to be addressed to the Secretary, Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W., Showground, Moore Park, Sydney, and must be delivered at Showground not later than 5 p.m. on Thursday, 30th March. All butter may be removed on Thursday afternoon 13th April. Each factory must supply agent with delivery order to obtain butter.

Storage of Export Butter.

All exhibits for storage will be placed in cool chamber and kept at a temperature not exceeding 20 degrees. The exhibits will be removed from cold store to Showground in readiness for judging.

Unclaimed Exhibits.

All exhibits unclaimed on Thursday, 13th April, will be sent to an agent and sold; the proceeds, less expenses, will be forwarded to exhibitor.
