Exhibitors are reminded that the Society's General Regulations apply to all sections of the Show and that the Special Regulations hereunder set out which apply to this section only are merely supplementary to the General Regulations.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

For the best Collection of Exhibits from Districts as defined in the following Regulations. Prize money will be provided by the Society in accordance with the number of Districts competing on the following basis:—

- 2. Any collection securing less than 70 per cent of the net maximum number of points will not be entitled to an award.
- 3 A Shield is offered for this Competition. The winner of the Competition each year to have name engraved on Shield and hold same for year. The Shield to be returned to the Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W. seven days before the succeeding Royal Easter Show.
- 4 (Special Prize)—Trophy, value £100, presented by the Commercial Bank of Australia, Ltd., will be awarded to the District securing the highest number of points for EFFECTIVE ARRANGEMENT AND ATTRACTIVENESS OF GENERAL DECORATIONS. The Trophy before being won outright must be won on three occasions in succession or five times in all by the same District. A memento will be awarded to each yearly winner.

6. On the recommendation of an Organiser of a District Committee, the Society may award a "Certificate of Merit" to a person who has contributed material of special merit for exhibition in the District Court. The number of such Certificates shall be limited to 20 to any one Court.

ORGANISING EXPENSES.

7. The sum of £1,500 for organising expenses (in addition to Prize Money) will be paid to each competing District.

TRANSPORT ALLOWANCES.

8. A sum of £100 will be paid by the Society to each District toward transport costs. By reason of distance an additional £100 will be granted to the Moreton and Downs, Q'ld. District, and an additional £50 to the Northern N.S.W. District,

BALANCE SHEET AND STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE.

9. The Society must be supplied with a Balance Sheet and a Statement of Receipts and Expenditure from each District Exhibit Organising Committee not later than 15th August each year.

FREIGHT CONDITIONS.

FREIGHT CONDITIONS.

10. Each District shall be responsible for payment of freight on exhibits notwithstanding the manner in which such exhibits are forwarded. (For allowance see Regulation 81. The N.S.W. Railways Department will carry free to Sydney exhibits certified by local Secretaries labelled, and endorsed "FOR DISTRICT EXHIBIT". However, freight is charged on the return journey and the amount so charged shall be paid by the Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W. and deducted from the freight allowance granted to each District. In addition exhibits consigned from Queensland will be carried free to the border of N.S.W. on the forward journey and charged for from the border on the return journey. Any parcel or package not bearing the District label must be sent carriage prepaid and no refund will be made by the Society of the amount so paid. The Society will be responsible for and bear all costs associated with the carriage of exhibits from Darling Harbour, Central Railway Station and or Alexandria Goods Yard to the Showground and from the Showground to the railhead for return.

EXHIBITS FOR INDIVIDUAL CLASSES IN THE AGRICULTURAL SECTION MUST NOT BE CONSIGNED WITH THOSE FOR THE DISTRICT EXHIBIT. Perishable exhibits consigned by passenger train must be endorsed "Non-Competitive Exhibit" then state the name of the district exhibit.

- 11. For the purpose of this Competition the State of New South Wales is nominally divided into four Districts. See page 10-14 for map showing District Houndaries. Exhibits from districts in other States are eligible to compete, such districts to be those recognised by the leading Society of the State represented.
- 12. Each District Court must be in charge of a responsible member or nominee of the organisations exhibiting same, who will have to arrange and display the exhibit to the best advantage.
- 13. All exhibits must be the bona fide production of the District exhibiting same. Any District committing a breach of this regulation will be liable to disqualification.
- 14. All exhibits must have been produced between 1st January, 1958, and 20th March, 1959.
- All exhibits will be ineligible for competition in the general classes.
- No produce of any Government Institution may be included in any exhibit except in the case of Butter and Cheese produced at a registered Dairy Produce Factory located in any Government Institution.

TROPHIES ON DISPLAY.

6. On the recommendation of an Organiser of a District Committee, the Society may award a "Certificate of Merit" to a person who has contributed material of special merit for exhibition in the District Court. The number of such Certificates shall be limited to 20 to any one Court.

7. The sum of £1,500 for organising expenses (in addition to Prize Money) will be paid to each competing District.

TRANSPORT ALLOWANCES.

8. A sum of £100 will be used by the Society to each District toward transport costs. By reason of distance an additional £100 will be granted to the Moreton and Downs, Q'ld. District, and an additional £50 to the Northern N.S.W. District.

BALANCE SHEET AND STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE.

The Society must be supplied with a Balance Sheet and a Statement of Receipts and Expenditure from each District Exhibit Organising Committee not later than 15th August each year.

FREIGHT CONDITIONS.

FREIGHT CONDITIONS.

10. Each District shall be responsible for payment of freight on exhibits not withstanding the manner in which such exhibits are forwarded. For allowance see Regulation 89. The N.S.W. Railways Department will carry free to Sydney shifting certified by local Secretaries labelled, and endorsed "FOR DISTRICT EXHIBIT". However, freight is charged on the teturn journey and the amount so charged and be paid by the Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W. and deducted from the freight allowance granted to each District. EXHIBITS OR NOIVIDIAL CLASSES IN THE AGRICULTURAL SECTION MUST NOT BE CONSIGNED WITH
THOSE FOR THE DISTRICT EXHIBIT. Perishable exhibits consigned by passenger train must be endorsed "NonCompetitive Exhibit" then state the name of the district exhibit.

GENERAL.

- 11. For the purpose of this Competition the State of New South Wales is nominally divided into four Districts. See page 10-14 for map showing District Boundaries. Exhibits from districts in other States are eligible to compete, such districts to be those recognised by the leading Society of the State represented.
- 12. Each District Court must be in charge of a responsible member or numinee of the organisations exhibiting same, who will have to arrange and display the exhibit to the best advantage.
- 13. All exhibits rout be the bona fide production of the District exhibiting same. Any District committing a breach of this regulation will be liable to disqualification.
- 14. All exhibits must have been produced between 1st January, 1958, and 20th March, 1959.
- 15. All exhibits will be ineligible for competition in the general classes.
- No produce of any Government Institution may be included in any exhibit except in the case of Butter and Cheese produced at a registered Dairy Produce Factory located in any Government Institution.

- 17. The Organisers MUST send Plans to the Director, Royal Agricultural Society, for approval or otherwise, for any alterations or re-arrangements to the existing Courts by lat October, 1958, otherwise the Organisers must use the stands in their Courts as used by them for the last Show. - 19. The Agricultural Hall shall be open to the Public on completion of judging and thereafter daily from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. except Monday, 23rd March, and Good Friday, 27th March, on which days the Pavilion will close at 6 p.m.

CONDITIONS OF JUDGING.

- 20. The sale of exhibits shall commence at 7 p.m., Tuesday, 31st March.
- 21. Each District shall eliminate from the Schedule of exhibits set down in Sections 1-13, sections, sub-sections, commodities or exhibits aggregating a total points value of 650 points, all such eliminations being subject to the approval of the Society's Agriculture Section Communes. A list of the exhibits selected for elimination must be lodged with the Society not later than 1st January, 1959. Where exhibits have been approved for elimination from commodities for judging such fact shall be indicated on the award card prior to commencement of judging, and will also be printed in the Catalogue.
- 22. The competition will be decided on the total points gained by the exhibits submitted for judging out of the net possible total of 9,750.
- 23. Where a District submits for judging fewer than the specified number of "exhibits" of any commodity as shown in the achedule the possible number of points shall be reduced accordingly, e.g. if six exhibits be required and only five are submitted for judging, the maximum number of points which could be awarded for the commodity would be five-sixths of the specified total points. NIL will be awarded in the case of each and every exhibit not submitted for judging as required.
- 24. In each section (numbered 1 to 13) and/or sub-section there is indicated the number of exhibits of each of the commodities to be submitted for judging. All exhibits submitted for judging on the floor must be staged unless otherwise provided under the scale of judging points.
- 25. Except where otherwise provided the judge of a commodity shall award points for each exhibit based on a maximum of 100 points for each exhibit.
- 26. The awards so made shall be handed by the respective Stewards to the Steward-in-Chief who will arrange for the aggregate points so allotted to be converted pro-rate to the appropriate points to two decimal places in relation to the maximum set down for the commodity in the Schedule.
- 27. A judge in any section may withhold his award until such time as he is satisfied that the exhibit is in accord with the conditions.
- 28. No exhibitor or person representing a District shall address any Judge while the latter is judging. All explanations must be supplied to the Stewards in every case. No Steward shall consult with the Judge or offer any advice or suggestion in respect to the number of points to be allotted in any case. During judging no person shall be admitted to the Courts except the Judges, Stewards, and Delegate or Delegates appointd by the District to explain any details which may be considered necessary by the Stewards.
- 29. A judge may seek from the Steward-in-Chief any ruling or interpretation of the conditions required.
- 30. In respect of any appeal or protest the matter shall be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of General Regulations Nos. 75 and 78.
- 31. The Society empowers the Agriculture Section Committee to adjudicate on any matter not otherwise specifically provided for in the Regulations.
- 32. A District Court Organiser (Representative) may seek a ruling or interpretation of the conditions through the Steward from the Steward-in-Chief and shall have the right to appeal thereon to the Society's Agriculture Section Committee.
- 33. The awards will be released after the time for lodging of the protests has expired.

 (For the purpose of the Commonwealth District Competition the decision of the Judges will be deemed to have been made when the final points become available from the Director. Any protests must be lodged within four hours of that time.)
- 34. The Judge shall be requested to return to the Courts the day after judging for the purpose of discussing with the District Court Officials the merits and/or demerits of the Court. In this connection suitable and definite appointments shall be made by the Steward-in-Chief and such times entered in an appointment book on the day of judging.

DEFINITIONS.



PAVILION OPEN TO PUBLIC.

The Dairy Produce Pavilion will be open to the public daily from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., except Monday, 23rd, and Good Friday, 27th March, on which days the Pavilion will close at 6 p.m.

TROPHIES ON DISPLAY.

Trophies offered for competition in the Dairy Produce Section shall be on display in the special windows provided for the purpose in the Society's General Showground Office.

SPECIAL DAIRY PRODUCE REGULATIONS.

Exhibitors are reminded that the Society's General Regulations apply to all sections of the Show and that the Special Regulations hereunder set out which apply to this section only are merely supplementary to the General Regulations.

Butter MUST be manufactured at the factory or branch factory in which name each entry is made. Only one entry may be made by each factory or branch factory in each class. Butter in all classes to be made from pasteurised cream and no preservative other than salt to be added. All butter exhibited may be subject to analysis.

BOXES.

All butter specially manufactured and prepared for exhibition purposes, must be packed in PLAIN STANDARD LOCAL BOXES (BRANDED BOXES NOT PERMITTED).

All exhibits for Classes 2 to 8 to be addressed to the Director, Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W., c/o. Waterside Cold Stores Pty., Ltd., 10 Point-st., Pyrmont, Sydney, and must be in cold store as stated in each class.

Exhibitors failing to observe this Regulation are liable to disqualification.

For purposes of identification a label, bearing the full name of the exhibitor (Factory) together with full particulars of the class for which the exhibit is intended, must be securely affixed to the lid of each box before it is wrapped in its protecting cover. Similar particulars regarding the identification of exhibits must also be sewn on the protective

The surface of the butter must be impressed with the Australian Roller Brand.

An exhibitor who may desire to go through the exhibits with the judge, after judging day, shall make an appointment through the Steward-in-Chief or the Director.

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
